

# OVERVIEW OF THE ONTARIO FINAL AGREEMENT FUNDING APPROACH FOR THE REFORMED FIRST NATIONS CHILD AND FAMILY SERVICES PROGRAM

## Funding for First Nations and FNCFS Service Providers

Funding flows to the First Nation directly or to a First Nation’s requested service provider (e.g., a FNCFS agency or another entity authorized by a First Nation) to deliver these services.

\$2,708.73 per capita (amount for 2026-27) (adjusted for inflation and remoteness)	Funding based on a First Nation’s highest annual amount of First Nation Representative Services funding between 2019-2020 and 2023-2024 (adjusted for population, inflation and remoteness)	\$328.2 million during the lifetime of the agreement (allocated based on eligible population - with a \$75,000 floor annually - and adjusted for remoteness)
Funding continues to be split between First Nations and FNCFS service providers. A First Nation may give notice directing how to allocate its funding. First Nations not served by a FNCFS agency receive the full amount of their prevention funding.	First Nation Representative Services funding flows directly to First Nations or FNCFS service providers.	Post-majority support services funding will be available directly to First Nations or FNCFS service providers to support First Nations youth and young adults in their transition to adulthood.

**TOP UPS** Information Technology (6% of Baseline), Results (5% of Baseline), Emergency\* (2% of Baseline)  
\* funding split between First Nations and FNCFS agencies

**HOUSEHOLD SUPPORTS** \$50.9 million during the lifetime of the agreement (allocated based on population below the Low-Income Measure-After Tax, and adjusted for inflation and remoteness)

**REMOTENESS** Upward adjustment, on applicable components, for First Nations with a 2021 Index of Remoteness score of 0.40 or greater and based on Remoteness Quotient Adjustment Factor

## Funding for FNCFS Agencies

Funding flows to agencies delegated or authorized according to provincial legislation to provide legislated child welfare services.

### BASELINE FUNDING

A portion of Baseline Funding will continue to be provided through the agreement with the Government of Ontario. ISC will also provide FNCFS agencies with an amount equal to 2022-2023 intake and investigation, legal fees, and building repairs costs, adjusted annually for inflation and population

Baseline funding supports FNCFS agencies in meeting statutory obligations related to operations and maintenance, including least disruptive measures.

**TOP UPS** Emergency\* (2% of Baseline)  
\* funding split between First Nations and FNCFS agencies

### CAPITAL

\$455 million during the lifetime of the agreement

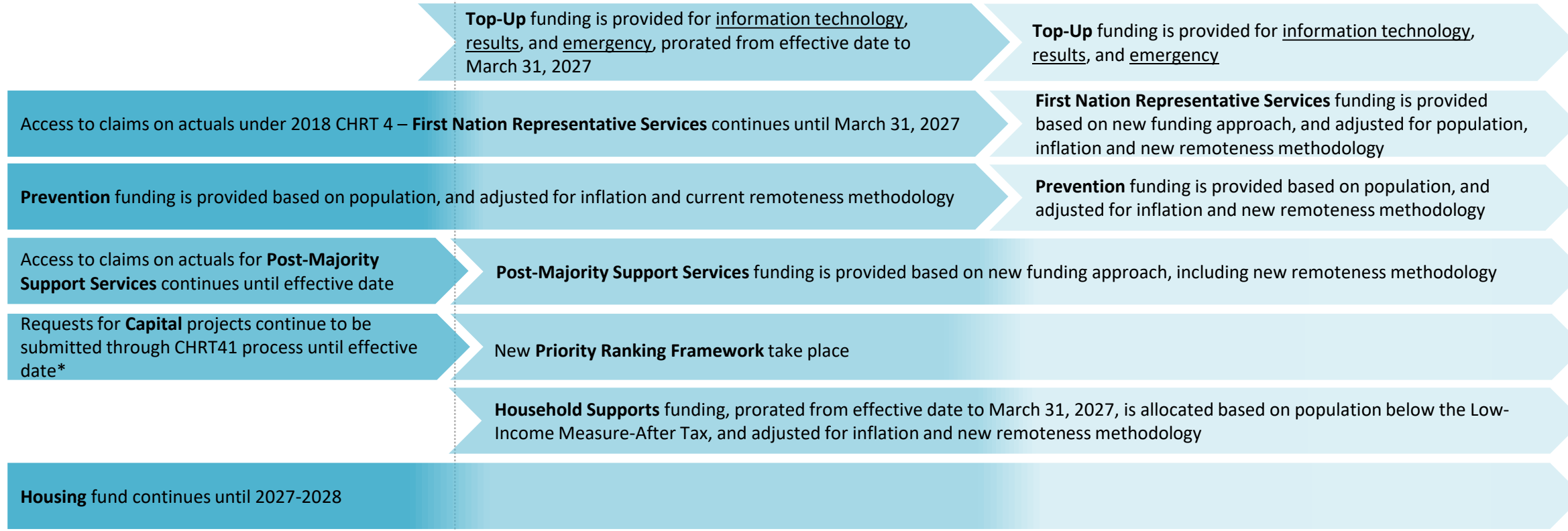
Funding available to First Nations and FNCFS service providers, where agreed upon with their affiliated First Nation(s), and supports the lifecycle costs of owned assets.

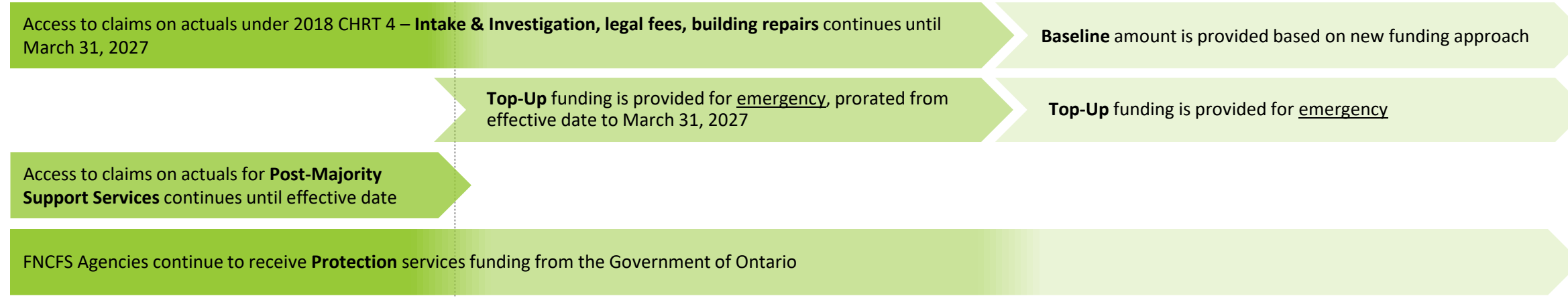
